PLAYGROUND

All the play equipment and surrounding safety surfacing in the playground are regularly inspected. Since 1963 the Parish Council has taken responsibility for the playground's upkeep and purchase of new equipment. INSTALLATION OF AVERAGE SPEED CAMERAS ON A24

We have been pushing Surrey Highways to install the camera equipment along this road for many years. We hope that now it is installed you will all appreciate the added safety it has brought to all drivers who use this section of the A24. It has taken some getting used to but we hope it will avoid the worst of accidents occurring at the junction with Mill Road. This has been at the top of our concerns for improved safety and one which we are still engaged with Surrey Highways. It is hoped further amendments to turning priority can be made to prevent any further accidents..

GATWICK NORTHERN RUNWAY EXPANSION

The Secretary of State for Transport has given consent for the development of Gatwick Airport. This includes a second runway which has the potential to double the number of flights that the airport can handle.

The Planning Inspectorate and all affected local councils had recommended against the expansion plan.

VILLAGE HALL

The Council continues to act as managing agents to the Trustees of the Village Hall. As well as accommodating the Village Club, the hall is available for hire for parties, clubs and events of any kind. There is a kitchen and bar facilities are available via the Village Club. COUNCILLORS

The Council advertised a vacancy on the council in June of this year following the resignation of Leslie Lester on health grounds. Peter High responded with interest and as no other proposals were received (following due procedure) Peter was co-opted on to the council. The council would like to thank Leslie for his valued support and input to the council and welcome Peter as his replacement.

Surrey County Council News

The following statement has been issued by Surrey County Council referring to the reorganisation of the county council. This has arisen due to Central Government policy, which they state will make local councils more in tune with local communities together with improvements in efficiency of running the County Councils.

Government has confirmed plans for local government reorganisation in Surrey, announcing that two new unitary councils will replace the existing twelve councils in April 2027, creating a simpler and more efficient system for delivering services across the county.

Government is clear that this once in a generation reform will see stronger local councils in charge of all local services, equipped to drive economic growth, improve local public services, and lead and empower their communities - ultimately it will help drive up living standards.

Elections for the new councils will take place in May 2026, with the new authorities formally taking over responsibilities from 1 April 2027. Existing Councillors will remain in post until 31 March 2027. This transition period will enable detailed work for reorganisation and devolution to take place, and services will be delivered as usual throughout the process.

Government is also clear that simplifying local government ensures a strong foundation for devolution. The establishment of a strategic authority will be subject to the relevant statutory tests being met and there will be ongoing discussions between local officials and the Minister. The ambition is to have a Mayor for Surrey, and local officials will be working with Government on the timeline for this, following discussions with the Minister for Devolution.

The creation of two unitary councils, East Surrey and West Surrey, means that from April 2027 an East Surrey unitary authority will replace the current areas covered by Elmbridge, Epsom and Ewell, Mole Valley, Reigate and Banstead, and Tandridge councils. A West Surrey unitary will take over the areas of Guildford, Runnymede, Spelthorne, Surrey Heath, Waverley, and Woking.

Holmwood Good Neighbours?

Poor public transport links and cuts in hospital transport mean that many, mainly older, people have great difficulty travelling to and from their medical appointments. A Good Neighbours scheme could fill this gap for our older residents, with a friendly team of volunteers. Could you be one such volunteer?

Other schemes in the area, notably in Capel and Dorking use their volunteer drivers (male or female) for this very rewarding work which is much appreciated by the passengers. Drivers can choose how often they drive - usually once a week. There is no obligation to be available at any special time and they can choose whether to accept each assignment or not. Petrol and parking expenses are reimbursed and a contributory charge is made to the passenger to help cover costs. You obviously need to reside in the area with your own car and be a good, reliable and careful driver who is patient and understanding. A DBS check is required (organised by the organisation), and you will need to check on your car insurance to ensure you are specifically covered for volunteer work. How do we know? One of the editors of this magazine has been a volunteer driver with the Dorking based Good Neighbours for over 9 years and is still going! If you have some spare time, please consider getting involved to help your neighbours in need. You never know when it may be your turn to request a lift! Please email editor.holmwood@gmail.com to let us know if you would be willing to help a neighbour in this way. If we get sufficient response to make it a go we can arrange help and support to set up a suitable scheme.

As this is a report to a new local magazine I think a quick explanation of what The Friends of Holmwood Common as a group are. The Friends are an independent group, with a constitution, committee and bank account which comes under the wing of the National Trust Supporters Group organisation. We are funded by membership subscriptions and donations received for activities we have organised such as fungus walks or evening meetings with outside speakers. We issue a regular newsletter. Our main purpose is to support the work of the National Trust on Holmwood Common.

During the year we have given financial support to the visit by a team of Heavy Horses which have tended Willow Green and Brook Valley meadows by raking, mowing and collecting grass using equipment towed by a pair of Clydesdale Horses. The occasions they visited have been highlights of the year. We are currently supporting an application by the National Trust ranger for the Common, Judith Ressler, for a grant from Surrey County Council for funds to support a regular visit by heavy horses and other activities.

Dear Member,

Having been on the Holmwood Village Produce Association committee for twenty-something years, and Chair for the last six, you would think writing to you, our members, would be easy. But this is about as far from easy as it gets.

The last few years have been extremely testing on so many fronts. Covid wiped out the show two years running. Then, just as we got back on our feet the huge diesel spill meant a last minute cancellation. As you know, that cost us dear. If it wasn't for your wonderful generosity, this years event would not have been able to happen at all. With your help, it did. And it was a lovely weekend as it always has been. However, numbers were low and resulted in a big loss, again. There are only so many times you can recover from that. Several committee members have had to stand down, for various reasons, and this leaves us with less than an ideal situation.

Without the finances, we cannot carry on staging the shows. Without a strong committee, we cannot make those shows happen. So much is done by us and our families. We have tried so hard, for years, to encourage membership and participation. It is exhausting and at times downright depressing when you try and hold something together that is becoming less and less viable. We have had many meetings, talked for hours, tried so very hard to find solutions. All to no avail.

I am genuinely struggling to write this. The show has been there my entire life. It is one of my earliest memories and every single one, for those 53 years, has been filled with happiness. And I know for many of you it has been there forever too.

So, I hope you understand how much it hurts to tell you that this years show was the last. Holmwood VPA is no more. I am so very deeply sorry. It feels very final now that it is on the screen in front of me.

To all our awesome committee members, past and present, the biggest thank you. Without all the work you put in, most unseen, none of it would have ever happened at all. We have been a great team, with a great bond that transcends the VPA boundaries. You are all truly fabulous people and I consider myself very blessed to count you as friends. From the bottom of my heart, thank you.

And to you, the members, thank you for your support. This year couldn't have happened without you. Please keep growing, making and creating. Don't stop just because the show is gone. You are the heart of the villages, always.

A few things to do in the garden during the winter

- 1. Empty Your Pots** Completely empty any of your outdoor planters and pots to prevent cracking and damage. Store pots upside down until you're ready to use them again in the spring.
- 2. Clean Up to Keep Pests Away** Clear away any dead or dying plants and vegetables to keep pests and disease at bay. Pests and blight can still thrive in winter months.
- 3. Gather Leaves for Mulch** Gather as many leaves as you can and add them to your compost pile.
- 4. Remove Bulbs to Prevent Frost Damage** Dig up your bulbs and store them in a cool, dark location so they will survive the winter. You want to remove bulbs from the garden bed before frost, so no damage occurs.
- 5. Till the Soil to Remove Pests** Till your soil gently; turn the top 2-3 inches to remove any pests that may be trying to winter in your garden beds.
- 6. Prune Trees and Shrubs** Prune away dead and broken leaves from your ornamental trees and shrubs, cutting the branches close to the trunk. Make clean, quick cuts to avoid damage to living parts of the plant.
- 7. Scrub Your Tools** Remove all debris and dirt. Cover all blades and metal parts with a thin layer of vegetable oil to prevent rust. Store all your tools properly so you can find them again in the spring.
- 8. Protect Sensitive Plants** Cover saplings and shrubs that could be damaged by winter cold. Do not use plastic for this, or it will kill plants. Material like sackcloth will provide protection for young and sensitive plants. Use twine to hold the fabric in place and check on the plants to be sure they're surviving the winter.
- 9. Prepare Your Perennials** After the ground has frozen for winter, cut your perennials back to about three inches above the soil and add a thick layer of mulch to keep the soil warm.

A little winter garden work will make a huge difference while also keeping you from doing a whole lot more work when it's time to plant again.




DORKING MUSEUM IN DECEMBER-JANUARY

To the Last Man – the Dorking Home Guard: The Museum's autumn exhibition tells the story of the men of Dorking and the villages who responded to the call by Anthony Eden, Secretary of State for War, to enlist in the 'People's Army' – later, the Home Guard – in 1940 to defend the nation. Five hundred men living in the town and immediate neighbourhood offered their services – many without any military experience, often in full-time work, and many volunteering for other home front organisations. The 7th (Dorking) Battalion, Surrey Home Guard, commanded by Major Geoffrey Lane, a veteran of the Boer War and First World War, was initially headquartered at the Old Fire Station on West Street (later at the Drill Hall).

A defensive line of concrete pill boxes and anti-tank obstacles stretched across the south, especially in the Dorking area, protecting the Mole Gap route towards London and the operational headquarters of the Southern Railway, responsible for transport of troops and supplies across the south of England. The Home Guard was called upon to establish strongholds, secure sites to ensure public safety and guard aircraft crash sites.

They faced what looked like a hopeless situation, at the time, poorly armed and equipped, often having worked a full day, then staying alert, facing a very real threat and expected to hold invaders at bay for a short time. Local units were trained for hand-to-hand fighting and told to take no prisoners. In December 1940, Brockham village featured in War Office propaganda photos designed to reassure the public that the defence of the nation was in the hands of well-equipped men. They went from a poorly armed and equipped group of part-time volunteers to a trained fighting force protecting the local community and freeing up regular troops for front-line duty.

The feared invasion never came, so their skills were never fully tested. The Dorking Battalion gave a public demonstration of weapons and defensive techniques on the Nower before being stood down at the end of 1944, having proved its value throughout the war. The exhibition display includes uniforms, weaponry, medals,

incident reports, photographs and other items of the period.

Dorking's Dinosaurs: After a very successful and well-received dinosaur-themed family event in autumn, our first new exhibition of 2026 will explore Dorking's dinosaur connections in greater detail, with further models on loan from the University of Southampton. Look out for further details and opening date.


All our staff live locally to pre-school, and many have been with us for considerable years. We have good local connections with community services and support networks, and we will always do our best to support our families however possible.
